## Work gallops along on equestrian centre

THE first sod has been turned on a \$5.5 million equestrian centre that is set to put Bawley Point on the map.

The Willinga Park Equestrian Centre, being built by entrepreneur and Canberra International Airport director Terry Snow AM, is scheduled for completion in March 2015.

The state-of-the-art facility will include 25 horse stables, riders' room, staff room, a veterinary clinic, training yards, stock holding and feeding yards, as well as a horse walker.

Mr Snow hopes to make Willinga Park the leading breeding facility of Australian Stock Horses as well as providing a venue for campdrafting competitions.

With the nearest centre of its type in Sydney, he expects the complex to be a sought after destination for equestrian enthusiasts.

Mr Snow said he was "over the moon" to turn the first sod on Wednesday.

"This year has been a big year for us in our breeding program," he said.

"We currently have more than 80 horses that call Willinga Park home and we are expecting 30 mares in our breeding program this year.

"We hope that people will come from all around Australia to see our facility here in Bawley Point and the specialist buildings here."

Willinga Park is home to Otford Valley Solar, winner of the Australian Stock Horse and reserve champion stallion at the Royal Easter Show, a horse Mr Snow proudly showcased at the opening event.

Willinga Park is expected to develop further in the future with plans to extend the already existing parklands and formal gardens to feature endangered native plants.

"Over the next five years we plan to feature parklands and extensive formal gardens," Mr Snow said.

"We will have a car park near the front gate so that visitors can come to the gardens.

"We will be working closely with the national botanical gardens to ensure the gardens feature plants endemic to this region of NSW."

Joining Mr Snow to start work by turning the first sod last week was State Member for South Coast, Shelley Hancock, who said it was "fantastic to see such a sig-

nificant development underway within the Southern Shoalhaven".

"Willinga Park is a visionary project for the southern Shoalhaven and will allow the training, breeding and developing of local stock horses as well as encourage those to come from afar to utilise the facility," Mrs Hancock said.

"The \$5.5 million investment in the local community will see up to 120 people employed over the 42 week construction period and generate a significant boost for local business.

"Local businesses and the greater Shoalhaven economy will be the beneficiary of this project with not only short-term construction investment, but long term employment and tourism gains," Mrs Hancock said.

Mr Snow was ranked by Forbes Magazine as Australia's 39th richest person last year with a net worth of \$755 million.

While Mollymook seems to be the main area of concern Ms Krogh said there had been no obvious clusters reported.

She said the water quality would not cause gastrointestinal illness.

"We have checked our records and we haven't had any recent

clusters of complaints regarding water quality, and we have had no reports of illness," she said.

"We also checked with the local health unit and they haven't had any reports of clusters of vomiting and or diarrhoea."

Ms Krogh is encouraging people with complaints about their water quality to contact

Shoalhaven Water.

"We certainly encourage our customers to let us know of any unusual taste or odour which they notice in the drinking water, this can help lock down specific causes," she said.

# Man pleads guilty to Milton hotel stabbing

A 19-YEAR-OLD Milton man had pleaded guilty to stabbing two men outside the Star Hotel at Milton late on Friday night.

Jordane Allan Ingold, of Caley Road, Bradbury, who also resides with his father and grandfather at Milton, posted on his Facebook account shortly after the attacks that he was, "Doing what I do best ill [sic] do time for this...!"

Appearing in Nowra Local Court on Monday he pleaded guilty to two counts of reckless wounding, two counts of assault occasioning actual bodily harm, being armed with intent to commit an indictable offence and being an excluded person returning to a licensed premises.

In facts before the court police said hotel security staff became aware of an incident near the rear of the poker machine area involving Ingold around 10.15pm on Friday evening.

Ingold was seen leaving the premises, was spoken to by security and told not to return.

About an hour later he was seen by security staff outside the hotel, looking in windows allegedly for the person with whom he had the earlier altercation.

Security confronted Ingold and told him the other man had left the hotel.

The first victim, who recognised Ingold, having attended the same high school, was also outside when Ingold turned and abused him, with the victim saying he pushed the accused away and saw a knife in his hand.

Facts state the man ran to the middle of the roadway to try and escape but when he turned Ingold was behind him.

The victim kicked Ingold in the chest but fell over.

Police said Ingold stood over the vic-



tim, holding a second knife.

As the victim tried to cover his head in defence, he was struck with a knife, suffering a deep laceration to the top and side of his right hand.

A second victim, who was a witness to the attack, came to the first man's aid, pushing Ingold away, but was struck in the face with a knife, suffering a cut under his right eye, next to his nose.

Both men were later treated at Milton Hospital.

Ingold left the scene but later contacted police who arrested him at a local address.

He was taken to Ulladulla police station, where his clothing, which had blood on it, was taken for DNA comparison.

Ingold pleaded guilty to all charges before Magistrate Alex Mijovich in Nowra Local Court on Monday.

Bail was not applied for and was formally refused and he was remanded in custody to appear in Nowra Local Court on July 28 for sentencing.
